CAL FIRE officers arrest Healdsburg firefighter for arson

On September 20, 2024, at approximately 8 am, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement officers arrested Robert Hernandez, age 38 of Healdsburg, at the Howard Forest Fire Station south of Willits on suspicion of arson to forest land in the areas surrounding Geyserville, Healdsburg, and Windsor.

Hernandez, a CAL FIRE fire apparatus engineer, is suspected of igniting five fires while he was off-duty: the Alexander Fire on August 15, 2024, the Windsor River Road Fire on September 8, 2024, the Geysers Fire on September 12, 2024, and the Geyser and Kinley fires on September 14, 2024.

All five fires combined burned less than an acre of wildland due to quick actions of residents and fire suppression resources.

Hernandez has been booked into Sonoma County Jail on charges of arson to forest land.

"I am appalled to learn one of our employees would violate the public's trust and attempt to tarnish the tireless work of the 12.000 women and men of CAL

3 detained after CDFW searches for unlawful grows, code violations

Wednesday, September 18, wildlife officers with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife Cannabis Program Enforcement served search warrants at five properties located around Bunim Road and Registered Guest Road, about 40 miles north of Willits, in Mendocino County. Support was provided by the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office and Lake County Sheriff's Office.

The search warrants were served to investigate the suspected unlawful cultivation of cannabis and associated environmental crimes. Prior to serving the search warrants, record checks were conducted on the properties to determine what steps may have been taken to secure a state license. In this case, none of the properties obtained a county permit or state license to cultivate or manufacture commercial cannabis.

If you're lacking any green and gold in your wardrobe, spirit gear is available to purchase at the home games including sweatshirts, pompoms, foam fingers, and more.



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PG&E electricity bills in October to include Climate Credit

In October, millions of residential and eligible small business customers will receive the California Climate Credit on their PG&E electric bill. Customers do not need to do anything to receive the credit.

Residential households with an active electric account will receive an electric credit of \$55.17, the same amount they received in the spring. The twice-a-year electric credit was first delivered in April, in addition to an annual natural gas credit of \$85.46 for residential customers with a natural gas account. Combined-use customers' total bill credits for 2024 is \$195.80.

Governor signs McGuire's Tribal Housing Reconstruction Act

Senate President pro Tempore Mike McGuire's Tribal Housing Reconstruction and Resiliency Act, which will create the first-ever dedicated tribal housing funding program in California, was signed into law by Governor Gavin Newsom on September 19.

Senate Bill 1187, a two-year effort by Senator McGuire to address the desperate need for tribal housing across the state, creates a tribal-specific housing program for the construction and rehabilitation of affordable homes for rent and sale. The program will also provide technical assistance to help tribal governments navigate the complex web of regulations that often hinder tribal housing projects.

Native American communities continue to face some of the most severe housing shortages in the state. Homelessness among Indigenous Californians is up to double that of the general population. One-third of tribal residents live below the federal poverty line, more than twice that of the rest of California's population. Approximately 9 percent of tribes in California have homes that lack complete plumbing, and 7 percent lack complete kitchens, according to U.S. Census data.

More than a third of Native households live in overcrowded conditions, and nearly two of every five tribal member households are rent-overburdened, further exacerbating the housing affordability crisis, according to a study by the Rural Community Assistance Corporation and the California Coalition for Rural Housing.



Willits man arrested for psilocybin mushrooms after calling police

On September 18, 2024 at about 8:30 pm, Mendocino County Sheriff's Office deputies were dispatched to a report of a male being held at gunpoint, by his girlfriend, in the 13000 block of Mountain House Road in Hopland.

Deputies arrived on scene and contacted the male who identified himself as Michael A. Giles, 41, of Willits. Giles told deputies while driving into Mendocino County, his girlfriend became paranoid and said they were being followed. Giles said his girlfriend shined a flashlight at him from behind, and he believed she was pointing a pistol at him.

Giles never actually saw a pistol, but feared for his safety and pulled over. Giles was able to walk away from his vehicle and contacted law enforcement for assistance.

fire. Learning to live with the risk, as the inhabitants simultaneously devise ways to create an environment in which nature and man can coexist, is a challenge that needs to be fulfilled.

"Today is a Pine Mountain Firewise Community workday," explained Lauren Robertson, vice-president of the Pine Mountain Firewise/Firesafe Communities. "We received a grant from the Mendocino County Firesafe Council to do workdays, so we came up and we picked out an area. During the 2017 fire [Redwood Complex], CAL FIRE contractors with bulldozers came up here, and they plowed a break on Tom Varney's property down to Tomki Road. We came back after the evacuation was over, and Tom saw this big swath with just trees pushed aside into gigantic piles, a huge mess.

"A shaded fuel break has lots of definitions but basically what the fire services use them for is to have a safe place to drop personnel in." Robertson

As long as humans choose to live in continued. "There's controversy because embers just fly across them. The idea with the shaded fuel break is that you thin, rather than strip out everything. If you strip out everything like they do with emergency fuel breaks, everything just grows back immediately. From our perspective, that is more dangerous because it provides ladder fuel. The grass is ladder fuel, especially if it's at the side of roads."

> With this in mind, members of the Pine Mountain Firewise, the Mendocino County Firesafe Council, the GrizzlyCorps Fellowship, and others joined together on a Friday morning to clean and trim the firebreak at Tom Varney's property. Varney, who has lived in this idyllic setting atop the mountain for many, many years, has been working on keeping the area and the firebreak trimmed and usable which is a constant struggle.

Nature will always find a way to renew itself, and new growth in this situation is a hazard to those who live there as it provides a way for a fire to begin and ignite larger fuel. The problem is exacerbated by the fact that Pine Mountain is a one-way in or out community with only sketchy alternate



'Transformers One'

The Story: Feature-length action/science fiction cartoon. It is the origin saga of an heroic band of shapeshifting robots who eventually became known as The Transformers. Long ago on the planet Cybertron, two metallic men, Orion Pax and D-16, are worker robots in the mines below the capital city.

They live a life of drudgery as slaves to a totalitarian government, but they have courage and a sense of Destiny. They challenge their lowly state in the allcontrolling bureaucracy. They rebel and risk their

Hero's Journey. They endure tests of fire and flame. They learn the secret history of a Great Betrayal. They witness a monstrous Behemoth of terrifying

Evil. And they achieve their true Destiny. We learn that ultimately these two Nobodies will become the legendary Optimus Prime and Megatron

> I kinda loved the movie. Along with the noisy and sometimes chaotic action sequences, there are some clever and quite funny moments. Honestly, I found this animated flick to be an affecting tale of courage.

> My Thoughts: I was not aware of Transformers until long after it ceased to be a noisy TV melodrama made to distract children. 

working with his crew for four years, and who loves working outdoors.

"It's a good place to work. It's great to be outdoors," he said. "This is my office. Mountains, hilltops, valleys, rivers. We even work on the coast. We're all over Mendocino. from Leggett down to Yorkville and almost Cloverdale, to the coast, Covelo, all over."

Angie Herman of the Pine Mountain Firewise/Firesafe Communities, said: "We have to have events like this, educational events. It's just a step above a firesafe council. It's quite a bit of work to get there. There are just four firewise councils in Mendocino County. A lot of it is education in getting the community together. We do free chipping days through the Mendocino Firesafe Council who provides the chipper.'

Scott Cratty, executive director of the Mendocino County Fire Safe Council, gave a short talk prior to the day's work to familiarize the volunteers and crews with the task and the plan for the morning.

"We exist to help people learn how to survive and thrive in a wildfire-prone environment," Cratty said. "Fire is inevitable. It is part of this environment. It is supposed to happen here. Earthquakes are a part of our environment, but we learn to adapt to them, building better buildings, so most survive now.

"People learn to build on stilts where it floods," Cratty continued. "We've adapted to all kinds of disasters and for some reason, it has taken us to about now to adapt to wildfires. Instead of trying to fight every fire, we need to realize that fire is going to happen, and we need to change how we build and landscape.

"The trick with wildfires," he said, "is that it is much more difficult than those other things because you not only need to change the way you build but also the way you landscape around the buildings. And you need to do it every year, because things grow back. We hope we're helping people learn to adapt their lifestyles to where they live so we can successfully coexist with fire."


Recently, the Mendocino County Fire Safe Council purchased an \$84,000 remote-controlled mower that will climb up and down extreme slopes and mitigate great swaths of dry growth which can fuel fires. The RC Mower has large rubber tracks and a 60" width. The remote control has a screen so the operator can see what is being mowed even if they can't see the machine. The mower was demonstrated on a neighbor's field to eliminate the

Throughout the day, the crews, armed with chain saws, weed wrenches, the RC Mower, and a rather large chipper worked diligently to mitigate the fuel, cutting manzanita and smaller trees, pulling up new trees before they can repopulate the side of the break, and generally trimming anything that could be a hazard in the future.

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





Superintendent Beebe gave an informational annual update on the district, saying there are approximately 40-45 potentially more students enrolled in the district for this school year. More accurate information will be presented after the census in the second week of October.

After the short update, Willits Teachers Association President Brian Bowles was welcomed to the podium for comments and updates. President Bowles shared that formula negotiations have begun and are currently underway, also applauding the new counselor at Blosser Lane Elementary School, Abby Stevens.

Bowles reported that Stevens has implemented a new curriculum that students receive well and has paired children's books with each lesson, supplying teachers of all grades with their own set of books for the classroom.

Stevens has also made badges and plastic lanyards for the staff at Blosser Lane, placing common problem-solving language on the lanyards to be used and taught to students for issues like playground conflict or interaction that goes wrong in the classroom, aiding students in adding to their toolbox of communication skills.

She has also created skill groups that refer students to group work to develop skills they need to work on, including "The Calm Club." This club allows students to have positive reinforcement instead of early morning recess.

Stevens is also making herself available to students by creating one-on-one conflict-resolution meetings, morning and end-of-day check-ins with some students, and offering parents the option to contact her if their child needs extra support at school. "I'm really excited that the program is off the ground," Bowles said, "and the amount of work has been an incredible amount over the summer."

The WTA also has more in the works, starting a Mentor Reading Program championed by Mr. Lewis and backed by the superintendent and board trustees. The program would bring Willits High School students to Brookside Elementary on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays to help mentor, teach, and encourage younger students to read. "Young kids are more motivated to read because of their older peers," Bowles said, with the program aiming to close the district's reading gap.

Another issue that people expressed concerns about during the meeting was a potential new cellphone policy. Currently, the board is developing a new cellphone policy, but has decided to hold off on implementing any new policy until the state has released the policy "baselines."

Superintendent Beebe said he was "fairly certain that the state's going to roll their plan out just when LA Unified rolls theirs out." Until then, it isn't likely a new policy will be enforced. Currently, the WUSD policy allows cell phones on campus, allowing students to use them outside the classroom, like during passing periods.

However, the discussion continues to lean toward banning cell phones altogether. WUSD board trustees and Superintendent Beebe have watched other schools implement a no-cellphone policy, however, and the results have not been as hoped.

The district is aware that there will be pushback against the policy, and it aims to get student and parent buy-in by educating families on the adverse side effects of cellphone usage in classes and at school sites. Superintendent

Beebe has acknowledged that students want to be on their phones and can be smart about how they use their phones in school, but the consequences of their actions can be detrimental to their mental health and hurt their education.

"To truly fix this crisis, we've worked in close partnership with California tribal leaders and organizations to end this injustice by passing the Tribal Housing Act. This measure will advance desperately needed dedicated affordable housing funding that meets the unique needs of tribal communities. I appreciate Governor Newsom's support for this effort, and signing this critical legislation into law."

Despite the clear need, the overwhelming majority of tribes in California have been unable to access existing state affordable housing funds. Preexisting funds are often too restrictive for tribes to meet the threshold and compliance requirements, and many of the requirements are mismatched compared to the needs that exist on tribal land.

The Tribal Housing Act will address the severe housing shortage that exists on tribal lands by creating a new and separate housing program for tribal governments, taking a similar approach to the Joe Serna Jr. Farmworker Housing Grant Program, which is a designated fund that exclusively serves the housing needs of farm workers across the Golden State.

Lake crew right now. Some of the department's new trucks have been coming down with mechanical issues. One in particular, Deputy Chief John Thomen's duty rig, a vehicle he's spent a great deal of time outfitting himself, had its transmission break. That rig is currently out of commission and being repaired. The department hasn't had it long, and its practically brand-new, so it's a disappointing setback.

Additionally, Engine 5469 had some electronic trouble which was causing it to slip out of gear. This same truck, which comes spec'd to CAL FIRE standards, also began to lose chunks of rubber from its tires while in operation. Administrative Assistant Schnitzius is hoping the tires are still under warranty as they run about \$1,000 per. The department is sourcing better-quality tires for this vehicle, but these issues, along with a few others, have the department shaking their heads and crossing their fingers that there will be no more "kinks" to work out with the newer trucks in their fleet.

Administrative Assistant Schnitzius also told the board she's on the hunt for grant money to purchase an interactive, inflatable, fire education house for the children in our community. The inflatable house, similar to a bounce house, would be used during Little Lake's events and trainings for kids, but could also be lent out to other county fire departments to use during their own events.

"Inside this blowup is a house," said Schnitzius. "It has a kitchen, a living room, a bedroom ... smoke alarms on the walls, things you have to crawl underneath. We can simulate smoke, and smoke alarm sounds to keep the cost down, otherwise it would be around \$10,000." Without all the bells and whistles, Schnitzius says she's hoping for grant money to purchase one at around \$6.500.

If so, it would be the only inflatable, fire education house in the county, and it would not only be used to teach kids how to get out of their homes during a fire emergency, but it would also be used to help kids understand how to put small, household fires out.

"I think about [fire education] all the time because I'm here. I hear about things all the time," said Schnitzius. "A lot of things that can be helped and were unfortunate. That's why I really push for education for the kids. Any kid can save a life."

Grant money is hard to come by and there's a lot of competition, but Schnitzius is always actively looking for opportunities.

Lastly, the board discussed the possibility of burn permits being issued solely through Mendocino County's Air Quality Management District and not the fire house. Right now, folks can get a small, 4X4 burn permit from Little Lake for free. Larger burn permits are issued through Air Quality. However, those smaller permits might also need to be sought through the Air Quality office, though the Little Lake team is unclear if that will be the case just yet.

During the service of the search warrants, officers eradicated over 7,478 illicit cannabis plants, destroyed 1,074 pounds of processed cannabis, one suspected poached deer was located, and opium "poppy" plants were seized.

There were numerous Water Code and Fish and Game Code violations documented. Of the 55 Fish and Game Code violations documented, eight were water diversions from headwater streams of salmon-bearing streams.

During the service of the search warrants three people were detained, and the investigations are ongoing.

Hernandez trained as inmate firefighter

Editor's Note: National outlet Politico.com reported Tuesday afternoon, "California firefighter charged with arson was former inmate." According to the story, an exclusive by reporter Camille von Kaenel, court records released Tuesday show Hernandez "started a six-year sentence in 2017 after being convicted of vehicular manslaughter while intoxicated in San Bernardino, according to county court records and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation."

The story continued: "He was released on parole in December 2018 after serving eight months as a firefighter at the Bishop-area Owens Valley Conservation Camp, one of several facilities jointly operated by CAL FIRE and the CDCR to put inmates to work fighting fires and shorten their sentences for good behavior. While on parole, he attended the Ventura Training Center, which educates and certifies former inmate firefighters, from January to October 2019. He was discharged from parole in November 2020, according to CDCR."

The Press Democrat reported Wednesday that Hernandez was scheduled to return to court October 11 for a bail hearing.


